

# WHAT'S IN THIS WEEK'S ISSUE?

Letter from Mr. Richards Head <u>of Schools</u>

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Last month, I was given a book called The Holy See's Teaching on Catholic Schools by Archbishop J. Michael Miller. The book was written in 2006, but a number of its messages are still pertinent today. I would like to give you a few of the book's highlights from the opening chapters, and how it connects with the upcoming elections.

First, the book highlights some worrisome statistics about Catholic Education. The peak of Catholic Education in the United States was in 1965 when 5.5 million students were enrolled in Catholic elementary and high schools. In 2004, that number was 1.78 million students.

This is despite the fact that the Catholic population and the population in the US grew rapidly during this time. According to current statistics, there are 1.69 million students for the 2023-2024 school year in Catholic schools. Of course, the main question is why? Why have the numbers dropped? What has prevented more students from attending Catholic schools?

The book poses a few reasons for this drop. First, the author points out the dramatic drop in the number of women and men entering religious vocations. In 1965, there were 180,000 religious sisters in the U.S. Today there are fewer than 42,000, with many of these being over 70 years of age. This is important for two main reasons. 1) Due to the cost of hiring laypersons as teachers and administrators, the cost of Catholic Education has risen dramatically. 2) While lay administrators and teachers can be amazing Catholic individuals, this is not built into a requirement for employment. Catholic schools need to make sure they maintain a true Catholic identity in everything they do and represent. As the author puts it, "(The Church) must have schools that are recognizably Catholic."

The author expands on the rising cost of Catholic Education by diving into the partnership between parents and Catholic schools. Archbishop Miller speaks of the importance of keeping Catholic education affordable and open to all parents yearning for this option for their children. He speaks in depth about how many countries around the world assist with subsidizing Catholic Education. This includes Australia, Canada, England, Belgium, France, Germany, Ireland, the Netherlands, Spain and Scotland. The United States, with countries such as Mexico, Italy, China, Cuba, and North Korea are the exceptions in withholding assistance.

Archbishop Miller states, "To advocate for some kind of government funding for Catholic education, as long as no unacceptable strings are attached, is the responsibility not just of parents of school-age children, but of all Catholics in their pursuit of justice. Too often Catholic Americans fail to appreciate that they have a right to subsidies for their school because these institutions provide a service to society. In no way would such assistance compromise the constitutional separation of Church and State. Rather, it guarantees the fundamental right of parents to choose a school for their children."

This topic is extremely important and pertinent as the citizens of Kentucky will vote on School Choice in November. The ability to not only maintain but to grow Catholic Education in the state of Kentucky is in your hands and the hands of all the voters. I ask that you prayerfully consider voting in favor of Amendment 2, which will increase the options for parents and students in Kentucky and lead to greater funding for our Catholic schools. While Holy Trinity itself may not immediately feel the full impact of this vote, a lot of schools within our Archdiocese will be given a lifeline as a result.



"On special occasions, students will be given a Non-uniform Day. On those days, students may ONLY wear:

- Long jeans, resource day sweatpants (joggers and track pants)
- If shorts are worn, they must be their resource day or uniform shorts.
- Shirts must have sleeves. No tank-tops/spaghetti straps should be worn.
- Shoes must have closed backs and closed toes. No cleats, boots, crocs, clogs, mules, roller skate shoes, moccasins, slippers, sandals or flip flops are permitted.
- All items must be neat and clean.
- Clothing must not be torn/ripped, be too revealing, or have inapporpriate messages.
- On Picture Day, girls may wear dresses for their pictures. They may not wear spaghetti strap dresses. The Administration will make the final decision as to the appropriateness of dress items."
