Learning About St. Francis Xavier

First and foremost, I hope everyone had a wonderful Thanksgiving Break. The next two weeks will fly by, but covering as much of the curriculum as possible during these weeks is truly important.

Last week we celebrated the Feast Day of St. Francis Xavier. While I am not promoting one local high school over the other, as I have said before, I do find it beneficial to know about the Saints who were so influential that schools in Louisville have been named after them.

St. Francis Xavier was one of the Church's greatest missionaries. He was born in Spain in 1506, the youngest in a large family. At 18, he left home to attend the University of Paris. There he met and then began to share an apartment with Ignatius of Loyola. Ignatius of Loyola was close to 20 years older than St. Francis and was quite loud and forceful in his evangelization of spreading God's word. St. Francis Xavier was very resistant at first to his new friend's evangelization, with sarcasm being his preferred method of combating it. The line that finally broke through to St. Francis Xavier from Ignatius of Loyola was the following: "What will it profit a man to gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?"

St. Francis Xavier underwent a profound transformation while living with Ignatius of Loyola. In 1534, he, Ignatius, and 5 other scholars made vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience to the Pope. This started the Society of Jesus(Jesuits). Shortly after St. Francis Xavier became a priest in 1537.

King John of Portugal requested that Pope Paull III send Jesuit missionaries to Portuguese colonies in India and other lands surrounding the Indian Ocean. After one missionary became gravely ill, St. Ignatius appointed St. Francis Xavier for this assignment. St. Francis Xavier followed the gospel mandate and took little with him for this journey. When they finally reached India (more than a year later) Francis jumped into action. He found that the native Christians in the area had no priests, no Masses, and no one to teach them The Creed, The Our Father, The Hail Mary, or The Commandments. St. Francis Xavier immediately began preaching, baptizing, and teaching the faith to all who would listen. He states in a letter "The older children would not let me eat or sleep until I taught them one prayer or another. Then I began to understand: 'The Kingdom of Heaven belongs to such as these.'"

St. Francis Xavier offered Mass with a community of lepers near Goa each week and visited them often. It is said that his sweet and caring personality and the respect he had towards those he worked with did just as much to spread God's word as the Gospels he read.

St. Francis Xavier continued to travel around India and throughout the Philippines, baptizing as many people as he could. It was said that he baptized and blessed so many people that his arms weakened and he could barely move them.

In the late 1540s, St. Francis Xavier set his sights on Japan and China. He realized the need to spread Christianity to these two countries. In August 1549, St. Francis Xavier and three other Jesuits reached Japan. St. Francis Xavier was first greeted warmly by the authorities, but when so many peasants flocked to St. Francis Xavier to convert and to be baptized they forbade him from preaching. St. Francis had a difficult time in Japan, but through his efforts, he paved the way for other missionaries to find success. He made plans to travel to China, even though it was closed to foreigners. St. Francis Xavier died just off the coast of China, awaiting a ship to bring him to the mainland on December 3, 1552.

St. Francis Xavier became one of the greatest missionaries in the church by living with and becoming one of the people he was serving. He ate the simplest of food, slept in the simplest of huts, and wore the simplest of clothes. Yet despite that, his life was marked by the greatest amount of joy imaginable. He is the patron saint of all foreign missions.

Four questions to ponder:

1) What defense mechanisms do I use to prevent me from truly following God's plan for me?

2) Do I see the students I serve as those to whom the Kingdom of God belongs?3) Is the way I am treating those I serve impacting them as much as the curriculum I am teaching?

4) What would it profit me to gain the whole world and lose my own soul?
